What This Workbook Does

This workbook helps a student generate material. It does not write an essay, select a topic for the student or replace the student's voice.

The strongest topic is not always the biggest event. It is often the story that reveals the clearest thinking.

Before You Start

- ☐ Work alone for the first brainstorming round.
- ☐ Write specific moments rather than broad themes.
- ☐ Include ordinary responsibilities and small changes.
- ☐ Do not judge ideas while generating them.
- ☐ Save editing for later.

2. Identify the Values Inside the Story

3. Test Three Story Ideas

Do I want to keep thinking about it?			

4. Build the Scene

Where am I?

Who is present?

What am I doing?

What can I see, hear or feel?

What problem, tension or question exists?

What did I think then?

What do I understand now?

5. Plan the First Draft

Opening moment or image

What happens next

The turning point

What I learned, questioned or changed

The final insight or forward-looking connection

Write the entire rough draft before trying to perfect the first paragraph.

Ethical Feedback Checklist

- ☐ The ideas and experiences belong to the student.
- ☐ The student wrote the draft.
- ☐ Feedback is given as questions and suggestions, not replacement paragraphs.
- ☐ The final wording sounds natural for the student.
- ☐ The essay does not exaggerate or invent experiences.
- ☐ The student can comfortably discuss the essay in an interview.
